Charlotte, who works with The Seeds of Change, a company specialising in personal development through equine facilitated learning, added: "I've wanted to ride at PSG for 25 years. We've a lot to consolidate at advanced medium, but I'm starting to think that I might actually get there."

Emily Stanford rode her own Korenbloem Vincit Omnia to victory in the medium open. Emily bought the Dutch-bred mare, now seven, from her trainer Andrew

Gould three years ago.

"Her greatest strength is her canterwork," she said of the "straightforward" mare. "She's started flying changes and she'll hopefully be ready for PSG later this year."

Colin Hicks took the medium restricted with his British-bred mare Ballantina on 70.76%.

"She usually lights up in a big environment, so I wasn't sure what I'd get," said Colin, an NHS psychologist who also works in private practice. "But she outperformed herself with a stonking score."

Colin bought Ballantina, now 10, as a four-year-old from an advert

in a local paper.
